And he was right.




Copenhagen dockers securing hawsers from a cruise liner by Terry Cherrill LRPS

Great River Race by Mike Longhurst FRPS






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Lunchbreak, Sandsend by Valerie Mather LRPS

There were hundreds of adults and kids around the public pool on the square in Bradford city centre. Is the lady in the foreground the mother of the girl running away in the background? Is she paying attention to what her assumed daughter is doing? Or are they both strangers to each other?

During 1990-91, Failaka Island fell victim to the Iraqi invasion. Now a depopulated island, like the modern-day Pompeii rained upon by volcanic ash in its glory days, Failaka lies bullet-ridden and abandoned. Ransacked, dust-laden and in ruins, its twentieth century affluence is documented in the relics of ornately tiled bathrooms and gardens, strips of plush wallpaper peeling like dead skin from crumbling walls. In the words Victor Burgin, such places are in themselves like photographic plates, 'having received the imprint of an event that has irreversibly transformed it'. As Didi-Hubermann puts it, 'Every photograph is the trace of a previous

state of the world, a vestige of how things were, and the summation of every photograph ever taken, he adds, 'is the ruin of the world'. In Pompeii II I seek to capture not only my own sense of paralysis in response to a traumatic human event, but to contribute to the palimpsest of photographic images that make up our more recent history.

The start of a buffalo race in Chonburi, Thailand by Nicholas Reuss ARPS

Them and us by Godfrey Pitt



I was in London to visit some galleries and deliberately walked through Trafalgar Square as I knew there would be lots going on. There were many clichéd images but I wanted to try to tell a story in one image. This was what I found.

The image was taken Tuesday 8th October 2019 at the Extinction Rebellion protest in Trafalgar square in London.

It depicts a banner created by the protesters in the foreground. Above the banner can be seen King Charles I on horseback and Horatio Nelson on his iconic column.

ing climate change. The banner's slogan is concise and pithy, "OIL = BOIL" refers to our use of fossil fuels and its impact on global warming and gives the image context.

The photograph is taken at a very low angle for two reasons. Firstly, the banner forms a barrier between the lord and the king on one side and the 'ordinary' people on the other. It is an icon for the rising sea level and the inference that it will only be the rich and powerful who can afford to choose where they live.


of society in a post climatic apocalypse. It forms part of a series of images I am collating over time, documenting mass public protests and it may form part of my Masters degree studies this year.
