Sue Totham has resigned her role as the Print Exhibition organiser. Thanks to Sue for her efforts, especially in dealing with the chaos of 2020. Ian Thompson has agreed to run both the Print and the Projected Image Competitions and takes on the role of Competition Secretary. This means there is a vacancy for the role of Print Exhibition organiser. This involves finding venues that can display our prints and organising the logistics of delivery of the prints to and from venues.

Barrie Brown has resigned as Head of Publications, as this role is now redundant, but Barrie is taking on the role of Centres Liaison where he will reach out and support the Centres in keeping in contact with their audiences and perhaps running their own online events. Barrie will retain his place on the Committee. Deborah Loth becomes Head of Communications, to ensure consistency of message across our contact with our members and the wider world. Deborah has already been doing this, so this just formalises the position.

Sue Hutton is taking on the role of DIG Web Editor and Dick Saunders has agreed to work with her in splitting the role. Many thanks to Sue Vaines for rescuing us by stepping in and keeping the wheels turning as temporary Web Editor, and for her time in handing over to Sue Hutton and Dick.

Avril Christiansen has joined the Committee's Zoom sub group to assist with speaker selection and Neill Taylor has joined to share Zoom administration for



This shot was taken in Sintra in 2015. I had overlooked it at the time and it was only when revisiting some old shots during lockdown that I realised that I had missed a few that I liked. In this one the pinks and yellows had prompted me to take the shot in the first place.

I cropped the original to about 2/3 of its size in each direction to emphasise the many rectangles and chose that as a title. I posted it on DIG's Facebook group and was delighted to get some very favourable

comments. Thank you DIG members.

I was travelling light on that particular holiday, taking just a couple of compact cameras with me. This was taken with a Caplio R7 which I had had since 2008. It is useful because it has a 7.1x optical zoom giving it a focal length of up to 200 mm (35mm equivalent) partly due to its tiny sensor.

Second place was 'Eucalyptus tree bark' by Janice Payne ARPS.

Members Annual Projected Image Competition



ATTENDING THE SELECTION MEETING

The Projected Image Competition entry deadline was midnight 31 August and it closed with 1902 entries to be considered by the selectors.

Saturday 19 September we are holding the selection day for the three classes of your images in this year's competition. Our selectors, Viveca Koh FRPS, Anne Sutcliffe FRPS and Stewart Wall ARPS, have all gamely agreed to take part 'remotely' and have already tested the combination of our custom scoring system working over the internet in tandem with Zoom video-conferencing.

This year we are offering Digital Imaging members the opportunity to watch the selection process live, on the day. You will view the images just as the selectors see them via Zoom video-conferencing.

TO ATTEND live selection online event, register <u>HERE</u>.

You will receive an email confirmation immediately after booking and a separate email with a link to access Zoom session prior to the event. Entrants can also view their scores, acceptances and awards in real time via the 'view my entries' submission system HERE.

The selectors will consider all the images in each class, and break out into a separate Zoom session to discuss the fine points of the selection, returning to go on to the next class. The process will start with all the Open Colour class images, followed by Open Monochrome and then Altered Reality. The approximate schedule for the day is as follows:

- 09.00 Zoom session starts
- 09.15 Attendees' waiting room opens
- 09.30 Selection starts with Open Colour class images
- 11.00 10-minute break
- 13.00 30-minute lunch break
- 15.30 10-minute break

We hope that you will be able to join us. If you have never seen a competition like this judged before you will find it fascinating to see how quickly images are marked and decisions are made.

MEET OUR PRESIDENT ELECT

When RPS President Dr Alan Hodgson ASIS HonFRPS took office last autumn he was able to get around to a number of RPS events and meetings before the pandemic put an end to getting around at all. But the President Elect did not take office until this spring, and has had less opportunity to meet members. So he's accepted our invitation to introduce himself to Digital Imaging.

It is perhaps best that I come clean from the outset! When Deborah asked if I would introduce myself to the readers of *DIG News* I questioned whether a photographer who predominantly shoots film might appear as a bit of a fraud writing something for the Digital Imaging Group. However, the more I thought about it, the more I felt that I could justify it on two counts ... firstly, my personal work - almost entirely film - is ultimately scanned for digital printing; secondly, my professional work is almost entirely

digital, such is the demand for speed between taking the shot, emailing it back to the office and it ending up on the sub-editor's computer. So, with that justification firmly established, let me introduce myself - and my RPS 'journey' - to DIG members.

I started talking photographs at the age of three and the passion for photography stayed with me throughout my school years, flourished at art college and now, completely undiminished, drives my work as a professional editorial and documentary photographer. In my late 'teens, my parents gave me an Olympus OM-10 camera (with a Manual Adapter!) and with only a 50mm standard lens, I set my sights on gaining my LRPS which I achieved in 1982, aged 17.


The following year, I started as a 'fresher' at Blackpool College to study for an HND in professional photography. In the late 70s and early 80s, Blackpool was perhaps the foremost college in the UK for anyone aspiring to be a professional photographer. I graduated in 1985, a year early (with two diplomas, one in professional photography and one in graphic design), foregoing my final year and

the Professional Qualifying Exam to accept a job offer as an advertising photographer. Before I left Blackpool, I received the British Institute of Professional Photography 'Student of the Year' Award and, during my final year, I gained my ARPS.

A few months after a calamitous event outside of Harrods involving me, my assistant and the Easter bunny (that is another story for another day!) I came to the opinion that advertising and I were not meant to have a long-standing relationship. Looking for an escape route, I accepted a magazine commission to record the archaeological excavation of a medieval cemetery in the city of York. This decision would influence the rest of my professional life - as a photographer and as an interpretative designer. Eventually, I joined the staff of the York Archaeological Trust as its Head of Photography and from 1987 I led a group of five photographers recording the archaeology and architecture of the city of York.

The year 1991 will remain one of my most memorable years. At the age of 27, with a panel of twenty photographs that I had taken for the series The Archaeology of York, I was able to put the letters FRPS after my name. My Fellowship panel was featured in the Photographic Journal (September 1991) and one of my photographs even made it on to the front cover. This was also the year that I had my first photograph published in National Geographic magazine - an ambition I had held since my schooldays.

In 1993, I became photographer and codirector of a Cultural Routes of the Council of Europe project called The Viking Routes

and two years later became photographer and co-director of an Oxford University multimedia project, *The Roman Empire*. Both projects involved extended travel across Europe photographing some of the most significant Viking and Roman sites and artefacts. In 1996, I was contracted to photograph the excavation of the Hội An wreck site in the South China Sea (which is where I first learnt how to strip down and rebuild an AK-47 ... again, another story for another day). The Hội An project took four years and cost an estimated US\$14 million, recovering over 250,000 intact examples of ceramics. The project - and my photographs - appeared in hundreds of magazines around the world.

Almost 35 years after graduating from Blackpool College, I now divide my time between my work as a professional editorial photographer (simonhillphotos.com) and as Group Managing Director of VIDAR Media Group (vidarmedia.com), a design practice working in the UK, Europe and Scandinavia (... but, like the Easter bunny, that must also be another story for another day although, when I do tell you about my design work, I must recount the story of how I bought a viking village for £1 and sold it to the government of Iceland for substantially more than that sum!)

As for the photography side of my life ... I still manage to keep pushing myself into new projects, some of them commissions, others purely personal projects, and I enter these images into as many competitions and exhibitions as time

allows. In 2017, I was the winner of the Longford International Art Portrait Award; in 2018, I gained Membre d'Art de la Fédération Internationale de l'Art Photographique (AFIAP) and, in 2019, gained Membre d'Excellence (EFIAP). That same year I was named 'Professional Photographer of the Year' by the British Institute of Professional Photography.

For the time being, my photographic efforts are channeled into a different route; a route which takes up a not insignificant amount of time. As a Trustee of the RPS and, since May of this year, as President Elect, I now have the opportunity to give something back to the Society of which I have been a member for almost 40 years and a Fellow for 30. Who would have thought that the young boy



I bought my first DSLR in early 2014 and later that year attended an evening class to help learn the basics of photography, which proved very useful! I gained my LRPS in 2016 and whilst taking shots for this started to feel the pull towards bird and nature photography.

In September 2018 I gained an ARPS with a panel of 'Birds of Conservation Concern' and learnt so much

during this process. I have also learnt loads from being a member of my camera club.

I really enjoy getting out into the countryside, to a nature reserve or riverbank, and seeing what I might find to photograph. This experience and type of photography is a perfect way to boost mental well-being.

My first two photographs were taken at RSPB Bempton Cliffs where I spent a few hours photographing Gannets as they wheeled and hovered above the cliff top, just prior to landing. At the end of the day I was able to capture shots of a Barn Owl as it hunted across the surrounding fields in the evening light.

Nature photography can be frustrating as some days you get to see very little but then other days you can hit the jackpot. On a recent visit to WWT Martin Mere I was able to capture a Reed Warbler feeding a juvenile Cuckoo, which was an amazing sight to witness.

My final photograph is of a Short-Eared Owl, which I was able to get quite close to. Though the branches are a bit of a jumble I have tried to diffuse them by reducing clarity and saturation, allowing the subject to stand out more. This bird is one of my favourites and I can't wait for the winter when it should return to its coastal feeding grounds. I think one of the keys to nature photography is to keep taking images of the same species in order to learn about behaviour, fieldcraft and optimal camera settings and hopefully, over time, get some great images.

Ashish Chalapuram





WHO IS BROOKS JENSEN?

Perhaps the most-often-quoted living photographer in the world is relatively unknown in the UK. So we've asked one of his great admirers to fill us in.

My introduction to Brooks was more of a slow discovery. It started with someone giving me a copy of a magazine called <u>LensWork</u>.

That was a revelation, a photographic magazine with superb images, talking about the art of images, the why not the how, no adverts for cameras and barely a sentence per article about the camera used.

I discovered PNC, Photography Not Cameras, a mantra that I have adopted. I love architecture but don't want

adverts for cement mixers in books about architecture.


LensWork widened my appreciation of photography and made me think more about what I did photographically. Then LensWork introduced me into the concept of projects, sets of images and books.

Eventually I realised that the magazine was steered by someone called an editor and his name was Brooks Jensen. I found reading his editorials an inspiring and challenging read. The flavour of the magazine came from Brooks.

I am pleased to have been introduced to *LensWork* and thence to Brooks. He has contributed to my experience and understanding of photography and for that I am very grateful.
