

#### **David Pearson ARPS**

When Deborah asked me to write a few words about this image my immediate reaction was 'what on earth is there to say about it?' The image was born out of sheer pandemic boredom.

Unable to get on a train up to London I just got my camera out one day and walked around our block of flats to see what I could find. This is simply the handrail at the foot of the main staircase.

Crouched down in a confined space, the most difficult thing was to get the composition right without falling over. I had to get the gap between the main rail and the far one about the same as that to the glass panel.

Post production I had to straighten everything up and crop to get the far rail going right into the corner and the bracket on the left just touching the edge. Then brightening it all up and boosting the clarity to get the look that I wanted. As it is essentially monochromatic, I tried it in black and white, but realised just how much depends on the thin blue line of reflection in the steel.

It has done well in most places that I've shown it. It just shows that a good picture can be made of the most mundane subject with a bit of luck and the incentive to try.



Compared to so many photographer's articles I have read, I still feel like one of the newbies in this world. My background was more painting and art - photographing things to paint rather than photographing things in their own right. I found a new passion when I got my first digital SLR and as for Photoshop, well, that ability to create pictures rather than just snaps was the catalyst I needed and I have never looked back.

I love to use techniques like slower shutter speeds and multiple exposures to create my I images rather than just

what you see in front of you.

I have found lockdown difficult photographically as I like to get out and about either finding new locations or finding characters for my creative images, which

we were obviously unable to do. I did however decide to practice some new skills. Instead of relying so much on Photoshop I wanted to do more in camera, such as the multiple exposure pictures.

I feel as a club judge for the SCFP it is important to have a broad experience of all genres of photography, and in order to do so, I have spent time producing images across most of the main genres to appreciate each one. On this journey I also discovered a drive to achieve other distinctions for example DPAGB, EFIAP/b and BPE3\*.

I am very lucky to live in the New Forest and close to the coast where most of these pictures have been taken. It was hard to narrow it down to only five of my favourites but I hope you enjoy them as much as I enjoyed making them.

In the future I would like to dip a toe into photo journalism and street photography, two areas I haven't really explored much yet. I feel that perhaps a less conspicuous camera may be needed. Thinking of Henri Cartier Bresson with his hand-painted Leica. Discretion seems to be the key with this genre and perhaps a new mirrorless camera will be in order – who doesn't like new toys?

#### **Desma Edney LRPS**

In 1962 I travelled to the UK stopping at Singapore, the capital of a good deal on many special things, such as cameras. There I bought my first 35mm camera a Minolta, and now many cameras and years later use a Sony A65 and find it fits most of my needs.

My first Sony, an A100, taught me that I needed tuition. This requirement was filled by City and Guilds through Grey Friars College in Colchester. Our tutor, Chris Farndell, encouraged his students to explore all aspects of photography and submit portfolios to the Guild for marking. Receiving Guild Distinctions gave

students an opportunity to have their work assessed by the RPS. I have stayed with that theory of exploration when I have a camera with me.


Eventually I returned to NZ and joined the North Shore Photographic Society then a year later the Photographic Society of New Zealand. Around 2015. Now, I have only kept up with the RPS.

#### ORDER AND DESIGN IN LANDSCAPE PHOTOGRAPHY

The Digital Imaging South East Centre has been offering outstanding virtual workshops on an array of creative subjects, ranging from Textures & Brushes, Lensbaby and Flower Photography through to Photoshop Basics, Lightroom, and Project Photography & Storytelling. In this article Melanie Chalk LRPS, the SE Centre Organiser, describes a recent workshop.

'Order and Design in
Landscape Photography'
was a recent workshop
with Steve Gosling in
which he gave an
introduction to
composition by talking
about how he designs his
photographs, about
breaking the rules and
how to use compositional
techniques to
communicate mood and

emotion. The students viewed a selection of his images to highlight the points he was making.

A project assignment was set and three weeks later three images from each attendee were critiqued and analysed by Steve. The majority of the images were new and taken specifically for the task and, as instructed by Steve, should specifically break the rules and demonstrate ideas that he had described.

On the night of the critique, each 'student' was was given equal time to listen Steve's detailed analysis of each image, and how it could be improved. Then everyone got involved in the discussion and all were very complimentary of each other's work. There were some stunning images produced. Those who took new images went out very close to home and stretched themselves by finding images in familiar places. Steve encouraged them to try new and different ways of approaching landscapes and to try and 'create a mood'. Mood is something that Steve strives for in his professional life as a photographer.
