MESSAGE from the President of FIAP

It is a pleasure for FIAP to award its patronage to the famous RPS AV-festival. This 9th edition will undoubtedly continue the tradition of a perfectly organised festival, where the quality of the presented sequences is setting a new standard in international festivals.

We want to congratulate all those who have their sequences projected in Bath; it is not only a reward for their efforts, but also a recognition of the fact that their sequences are more than just slides with sound, but that they are true "diaporamas".

In the world of audio-visual sometimes rumours start to circulate, spreading the idea that there is a crisis in the diaporama. Let us be very careful about such negative statements. Statistics made in January 1989 showed that the number of sequences presented in festivals was increasing, although the number of authors was decreasing. Since then however, many new names have popped up, and what is more important, these new authors are sometimes very young. We also see that the diaporama itself is very much alive, but that an evolution is taking place. The trend seems to be towards sequences which are made in such a way that neither film nor video could replace them. The sequences also tend to become shorter, with good rythm, and without the torrents of words we used to undergo. I think such an evolution is very positive.

A crisis could be looming ahead, but it can easily be averted. If authors lock themselves up in their own national circuit, then the diaporama could indeed become anaemic. The international festivals, like the one at Bath have an extremely important role to play: they are the meeting place where AV-authors see each other's work on an international level, where new ideas are spread and where other styles can be appreciated. If the authors are willing to continue to produce excellent sequences, and if we can count on the international festivals like the one at Bath to ensure international exchanges of ideas, then I'm sure the diaporama will be alive and kicking for many years to come.

Congratulations and many thanks for organising the 9th RPS International AV-festival.

MESSAGE from the President of FICS

The International Federation of Hunters of Sound was founded in 1956 in the early days of the amateur tape recording movement. The Jean Thévenot Medal is named after the French journalist who was a co-founder of the Federation, and who was also dedicated to the creation and maintenance of sound archives. On the face of the Medal is a portrait of Charles Cros (1842-1888), a multi-talented scientist who was involved in the invention of colour photography and on the 18th April 1887 applied to the Academy of Science in Paris for a patent for an apparatus "to record sound called Paleophone". The Medal is offered to International Competitions possessing a special element of recorded sound, and is awarded only to the work in which the creative and technical qualities of the sound part have contributed significantly to the success of the whole.

THE R.P.S. CENTRE

The Octagon, Milsom Street, Bath

The Society's Centre attracts an international audience, now numbering over 150,000 visitors a year. It is the largest space in Britain devoted solely to photography. It contains six galleries, a shop, a lecture theatre, darkrooms, a restaurant, as well of course as the Museum and Collections, acknowledged to be among the most important in the world. Only in the R.P.S. Centre can the public see a Nièpce Heliograph of 1827, one of the very first permanent photographs ever taken. Other unique items on show in the historical display include some of Fox Talbot's own cameras, and the great Newton Collection of Leicas and Leica equipment.

But perhaps the most exciting aspect of the Centre is the contemporary scene. On average, no less than 30 top flight photographic exhibitions are mounted every year. As well as showing the work of world-famous names, the encouragement of young photographers has a high priority, with a small but special area devoted to exhibitions of their work. The Centre also runs an active programme of workshiops, lectures, talks and many children's and educational projects.

Behind the scenes, the Curator and her staff administer and maintain the great historical collection of 100,000 prints and negatives, 11,000 books, 10,000 bound periodicals, 6,000 letters of historical interest, and nearly 6,000 items of equipment. Work is constantly in hand on the conservation of this priceless part of our photographic heritage.

The Royal Photographic Society's Centre is a lively, bubbling and exciting place to visit!
