High Level Itinerary

Day 1: Luang Prabang Arrival.

"Sabaidee" - Welcome to magical Laos! Upon arrival at Luang Prabang International Airport, you will be picked up by a local tour guide and transferred to our hotel.

Days 2, 3 and 4: Luang Prabang.

We have three full days to enjoy and photograph in the Luang Prabang area. It is the best-known place in Laos, having a strong French influence and a long history of tourism. It is significant Buddhist centre and, on one of the mornings, an early start provides the opportunity to witness the captivating, centuries old, daily tradition of the alms giving ceremony, Tak Bat. Before sunrise, hundreds of saffron-clad monks file out from the old town's 35 temples to collect their daily alms from faithful local residents. For those that wish, you can join in the giving of alms.

Luang Prabang has a very friendly, very photogenic, fresh food market sprawling along narrow lanes. Previously, we enjoyed this market so much that we went twice!

Luang Prabang is a significant historic Buddhist centre and we will visit some of it's most historically important temples, including the magnificent stupa of 16th Century Wat Wisunarat, Wat That Luang, traditionally the cremation site for Lao Royalty, and Wat Xieng Thong, with its classic Lao style roofs. During these visits, we will be looking to meet and photograph some of the many monks that reside here.

There are many craft workshops in Luang Prabang and we may visit weaving, paper-making and silversmith workshops.

We will head out across the rice field landscape to the beautiful Kuang Si waterfalls, with its multitiered turquoise pools set in a beautiful lush forest setting.

Luang Prabang is set on the Mekong and perhaps the best way to see the river activity is to hop on a local ferry across the Mekong River to visit a local village.

Day 5: Luang Prabang – Vientiene

Recently, the Chinese have built a high-speed railway across Laos. This means that we can sit back and enjoy a 2.5 hour train journey to the Capital city, Vientiane. On arrival we will be able to visit a unique temple, Wat Sisaket, with its 2000 Buddha statues and the Great Stupa at Pha That Luang.

Day 6: Vientiane - Pakse - Paksong

Have a breakfast at the hotel then transfer to Vientiane airport for the internal flight to Pakse, the capital of Champasak Province. On arrival, we meet another tour guide and driver then begin our discoveries with a scenic drive through mountains and winding roads all the way up to the region of Bolaven Plateau.

An expanse of highland formed from an ancient volcano, Bolaven Plateau is resplendent with lush jungles, rivers, scenic farmlands and diverse ethnic communities. Explore this naturally beautiful and cool climate elevated region. Start with a visit to the Tad Fane Waterfalls, 120 meters high and located in the Dong Hua Sao Nature Reserve. Continue to the Tad Yeung waterfall, which drops an impressive 42 meters and are surrounded by lush vegetation.

Day 7: Paksong to Champasak.

We are spending our morning on a jeep tour to visit a coffee plantation, an ethnic village, and just to be in the natural environment.

Later we head back down to the Mekong where we spend the night in a riverside hotel.

Day 8: Pakse - Wat Phou - 4,000 Islands.

After breakfast, check out the hotel and journey along Mekong River to Don Khong in the south of Champasak. Stop at Wat Phou to visit this UNESCO World Heritage Site. Dating back more than 1,000 years, Wat Phou is a spectacular pre-Angkorian temple of southern Laos. Explore this mythical temple ruins and tumbledown structures. Paul says "I really enjoyed this ancient temple and it offered some of the best photography of the tour. To reach the old temple we need to climb a steep hill!"

We continue to Khong Island, the biggest island in Southern Laos and the start of the 4,000 Islands. Called "Siphandon" in Laotian language, this area is where the Mekong stretches over 14km wide and houses thousands of islands between its cascades and rapids.

Later in the afternoon, you will arrive in the peaceful island of Don Khong, home to small villages and plantations, where we spend the night. On the east bank of the Mekong, our hotel offers great sunset and sunrise photography opportunities.

Day 9: Explore 4,000 Islands

Embark on a traditional long-tail boat and cruise amongst the Siphandon riverine archipelago. Explore this peaceful rural island where locals live out a simple life. Once a minor 19th century French Indochina settlement, Don Khong reveals a handful of colonial-era buildings including an old French railway station. Continue to the 10km-long Khone Pha Pheng Falls, Southeast Asia's largest waterfalls and one of Laos' best natural attractions.

Day 10: Khong Island (Laos) – Drive to Siem Reap (Cambodia).

Check out hotel and get ready at around 7 A.M for the long journey by car to Siem Reap (Cambodia). Stop at to the Lao/ Cambodian border (Nong Nok Khiene/ Trapeang Kreal) for visa stamp. Farewell Laotian guide and driver then meet the others in Cambodia territory We now face our longest day of road travel with 6 hours on often bumpy roads, to Siem Reap.

Days 11,12,13: We have 3 days to enjoy the Angkor Wat temples, the villages of Tonle Sap and the markets and shops of Siem Reap.

Paul says "In choosing to have 3 full days in Siem Reap, it allows us to cover the vast temple sites in a more relaxed way"

Angkor Wat is the name of the largest of the temples, but there are over 70 temples on the vast complex. Perhaps the more photogenic ones are tree-overgrown Ta Prom (made most famous by the Tomb Raider film) and Angkor Thom, with it's huge carved heads.

Paul continues, "However, it is not all about temples. The stilted (Kompong) and floating (Chong Kneas) villages of Tonle Sap lake offer unique photography opportunities and Siem Reap has one of the largest fresh food markets that I have visitied".

Your Experience with Paul Sansome

Paul is one of the UK's most successful fine art photographers, selling photography to hang on people's walls since becoming a professional in 2003. Paul has been Highly Commended in the prestigious Wildlife Photographer of the Year, has many times featured in Landscape Photographer of the Year and in 2017 won the first of several major awards in the Travel Photographer of the Year competition; it is very unusual for a



photographer to be recognised in different genres. For the past 20 years, Paul has been leading four or five photography holidays each year to countries that include Italy, Morocco, Iceland, Myanmar, Vietnam and India.

On the trips there is an emphasis on both having a great holiday and also on taking great photographs. Paul also looks to improve the client's photography skills. We visit locations specifically because they offer good photo opportunities and spend much longer at any given location than a normal tour because photography can often need that little bit of patience to get the perfect shot. Of course, we are travelling with a group that has the shared interest in both photography and travel.

Paul says, "On our trips into Asia, I have the strongest passion for capturing the character and lifestyle of the people that we encounter". There is group education at the beginning of the tour so that clients have an awareness of some creative and compositional ideas as well as a strong technical grounding in how to get the best results. Paul is always available on location and the guidance given when alongside someone taking the photographs is probably the most instructive.
