## **Post AGM answers**

The RPS has taken an interest in AI as it affects image making for several years and in June 2023 we published a <u>statement</u> setting out the RPS's position. Later that year we held a conference which considered AI and photography from a range of perspectives: legal, as an application for people working with images, and as a creative tool. Separately we are involved with industry bodies such as the British Copyright Council and Creative Rights Alliance to influence government policy and legislation to protect the rights of photographers and the wider creative sector.

The RPS trustees have recently initiated a new review of AI, reflecting the progress it has made since 2023, and will be consulting within and outside of the membership, with a view to updating the RPS' position on AI and image-making. AI is clearly not going away and it is appropriate, and indeed essential, for the RPS to keep abreast of developments and to educate our members about how it is being used, the opportunities it offers for creativity and, of course, some of the wider legal and ethical concerns around it.

### Live answer summary

For the benefit of Members unfamiliar with the Chartered Photographer designation, this is the terminal qualification for professional photographers in the UK and is awarded exclusively by the RPS as the learned society for photography. The Chartered Photographer designation was included in the provisions of the Royal Charter granted to the Society in 2004, but those provisions were never enabled.

Following a five-year period of negotiation with the Privy Council and with the support of representative bodies for professional photographers in the UK, a formal Regulations document was written and submitted to the Privy Council on 1 June 2021. A series of formal approvals were then required in order for the Chartered Photographer designation to become active.

The full roll-out of the designation is planned for 2026. In the meantime, any qualified professional photographers who would like to consider applying for the designation can contact the RPS on chartered@rps.org and request information which includes a table of criteria approved by the Privy Council, an FAQ document that we hope will answer any questions that applicants may have, and an application form. The application fee is £70.

Simon Hill was the first Chartered Photographer as the Regulations required a qualified professional photographer to nominate subsequent potential Chartered Photographers (to avoid the 'Catch 22' situation of having no Chartered Photographer to nominate subsequent Chartered Photographers). The Regulations confirming this were approved by the Privy Council. Simon's application for CPhot was reviewed by Dan Jones (CEO) and Andy Moore (Distinctions Manager), and the full £70 application fee was paid by Simon. Yes, evidenced CPD will be required.

### Live answer summary

Working Group timescale – anticipated to be over the next few months [Oct onwards]. There is a draft Terms of Reference which the Working Group will be reviewing. Working Group will review the feedback and their comments will feed into the second draft. Hoping to start A & Fs (New Framework) in early summer. Wraparound support will be designed once the New Framework is at a final draft/sign off stage.

Confidentiality – the documents are not being shared widely as they are still in draft format. Key stakeholder groups are being consulted but similarly to many organisations draft documents are not shared in the wider public domain in order to avoid rumours, hypotheses and assumptions. It is for common sense/practical reasons as opposed to secrecy.

## Unable to answer on the day, further information now provided

Licentiate pass rate - Approximately 26% of our Membership hold the Licentiate distinction with an estimated 30% either working towards an application for Licentiate or considering working towards Licentiate. Typically, annually there are between 190 and 200 applications for LRPS of which around 84 are successful (around 43% pass rate).

Analogue LRPS - It is not useful to conflate the ambitions or policies of a particular SIG (for example, Analogue Group) with a particular distinction (for example, Licentiate, which is now purely in digital formats). While the Analogue Group exists to encourage, support and celebrate analogue photography, the digital Licentiate has a very different remit - it is a certificate of competency in the art and craft of photography. Photography today is predominantly digital, and it is therefore entirely appropriate that our 'first level' distinction reflects this. It is unlikely that, today, a 'new' entrant to photography would begin with analogue photography. If they did begin in analogue photography, it would not be difficult for them to make digital versions of their analogue work and submit this for assessment at Licentiate. If an analogue photographer already has competency in the art and craft of photography, there is nothing to stop them from bypassing the digital Licentiate distinction and applying directly for an Associate distinction with their analogue outputs.

#### Post AGM answers

Al in Licentiate feedback - we use Al in two ways a) to check the grammar and spelling of the written comments submitted by the assessors and b) to create a summary. Whilst I'm aware that Al has its negatives and content produced by ChatGPT and others can sometimes look very 'Al-y', what it does mean is that we can be more efficient with our time which benefits our applicants. For the first time since 1974 (when the Licentiate was introduced) we are now able to offer feedback to all applicants which can only be a positive thing.

Distinctions data and member feedback – we will be sending out a survey to all recent (three years) applicants, and this will help us understand why there is a decline in Distinctions applications as well as provide us with a large amount of other data.

Staffing – the Distinctions team has a headcount of 1.6 FTE, and we are always reviewing staffing levels processes to ensure that our members get excellent service. There will of course be time when we fall short of our standards and in that situation I'd encourage you to contact the Distinctions team and/or me [Victoria] in order to resolve the issue.

Photobooks - My apologies for moving the slide on too quickly [SH]. The footnote stated that the 2005 application and passes figures (correct to 17 September 2025) included those for Photobooks whereas the figures for previous years (2023 and 2024) did not include Photobooks.

LRPS advisory session – this event was cancelled due to assessor availability. We were able to offer some people alternative dates but sadly not for everyone. Those applicants who were unable to be reallocated to a new date have now been contacted and offered a refund.

### Live answer summary

None of the images in the exhibition were selected purely on the text, and photographic merit is the primary reason for selection. During the two-day print selection process the prints are examined and discussed, and the text is available for the panel to review if required. All the images in the exhibition have been voted by all 5 selectors to be included in the final exhibition.
