Looking for something to do? Going to be in Florence?

OBIETTIVO BUCHETTE

The historic Wine Doors of Florence are the subject of a unique and delightful photography exhibition in Florence this Autumn/Winter.

Opening on the 9th November 2019 at the Teatro della Pergola, Florence, the exhibition features work by photographer Andrew Barrow MA ARPS and researcher and street photographer Robbin Gheesling.

The Wine Doors are serving hatches that allowed the noble landowners of Tuscany to sell their wines within the city walls. Their use spans the centuries from the Medici period right up until the early years of the last century. Over 160 remains have been documented with many more lost to development.



Expanding the work from his recent successful master's degree in photography (from Falmouth University), Andrew Barrow take a fine art and conceptual approach in capturing these unique historical remnants. He looks at the passage of time and how these purely functional doors have been repurposed, ignored in the face of air conditioning ducts and gas pipes or reused as letter boxes or as an evolving canvas for street artists.

Robbin brings her eye to the doors with a more documentary street art approach, placing the doors firmly in the present with the city's inhabitants playing a pivotal role in her unique approach to recording the wine doors in the contemporary environment.

Both Andrew and Robbin will be present on the opening night and are available for interview. Robbin will have examples of her handmade photobook available while Andrew will also show a bespoke, limited edition, portfolio box, that also formed part of his photography MA. Both book and portfolio box will be available for purchase as are limited edition copies of the 30 prints on display.

The event is being organised by the local Wine Doors historical cultural association, the Buchette Del Vino.

Italian Exhibition for a Travel Group member

The Wine Doors of Florence Exhibition

Ignored, disused, swamped by gas grills, heating ducts, and water pipes or repurposed as letter boxes or a canvas for street art and more basic graffiti... this was the premise for my MA Final Project (in Photography with Falmouth University) with a portfolio of images featuring the Wine Doors of Florence. And now these images are to form part of an exhibition in Florence itself.

The Wine Doors are serving hatches, or rather the remnants of them, that are found across the historical centre of Florence. They date from the Medici period and were in use right up until the early years of the last century. A law allowed noble landowners to sell wine mainly, although other produce was also sold through them, from properties within the city. You came along with your flask and handed it through the door to the wine cellar or shop behind for a refill.

There are 260 odd doors still remaining within the city and scattered across other Tuscan towns. Many more are thought to have vanished entirely. Indeed during my research, I discovered an image of a previously unrecorded door in the Alinari photo archives. A call out on Facebook soon identified the location. It is still a wine bar in Piazza Peruzzi, but the wine door has long since vanished.

I took a fine art approach to the images along with a more conceptual edge alluding to the passage of time and how people simply ignore these insignificant historical remains. One of my course tutors, who lived in Florence for a year, had no idea of their existence. The other delights and attractions of Florence perhaps eclipse these little wine doors. However, since this photographic project began, I've noticed that some local tour guides include a stop at one or two of the more ornate doors. This is probably due to the creation of the Buchette Del Vino, a local cultural association that has recorded and monitors the wine doors.

It was this association that invited me to exhibit my photographs alongside American researcher Robbin Gheesling's more documentary photographic images of the doors. It was Robbin that first highlighted these doors to me several years ago.

The association, despite its good intentions, are rather adverse to the 'reuse' of the wine doors, especially when graffiti and street art appear in or near them. But I'm rather a fan and enjoy repeat visits to see how the art changes with time or is replaced with something new. The street art of Florence just happens to be the subject for my next project.

Several of the Wine Door images have been exhibited in an Italian wine bar in Covent Garden and in a large exhibition in my home town (a showcasing requirement of the MA) but this is my first international exhibition.

Incidentally 'Obiettivo', I have been advised, which doesn't translate well into English means "a lens, an objective, a lens in the sense of 'focus'!" Rather apt I thought.

The Wine Doors of Florence Photography Exhibition, Obiettivo Buchette is to be held in the Caffè Guido Guidi-Teatro della Pergola, opening 9th November 2019 (17.30 to 19:30 with refreshments) and runs until January 2020.

The Travel Image of the Month

A number of members have suggested that the Image of the Month competition run within the Travel Group needed to be reviewed. In response, and in the hope that you will share your favourite travel images with other members of the group, we have made some changes which we hope will result in a much more engaging competition.

The long-term plan is that each year the twelve Images of the Month will be in competition to be the Image of the Year and that single image will then be judged against the best image in the annual PIC (Projected Image Competition) as a candidate for the Wakelin Trophy. This will happen first at the Spring Event in 2021.

Rather than use either Facebook or the Galleries,

- we are now asking members to submit a single favourite photograph that reflects the
 essence of travel photography to you each month. These shots will form part of a monthly
 gallery that can be viewed on the website, from which a featured image for the month will be
 chosen.
- For the remainder of this calendar year at least the selection will be made by Richard Lewis ARPS who has made the earlier selections this year.
- The winning shot will be added to the Travel Image of the Month page on the website, with the overall monthly winners competing to be the Group's best travel photograph of the year.
- Remember:
 - Travel Photography communicates a sense of place;
 - Image manipulation that significantly alters the truth of the situation or event is not permitted.

For November and December 2019, entries which Travel Group members have been taken in previous years can be submitted, while from January 2020 onwards shots should be new.

To be included in the competition, please email your image (no more than 580px wide because of page restrictions – no limit on how tall, within reason!) to travelcompetitions@rps.org.

You should get an acknowledgement of the receipt of the image. Make sure you include your name and a title for your shot.

Entries will be accepted for November 2019 onwards.

Following an invitation from those organising the Nature Group's annual exhibition at Wingfield, we agreed to take a gallery at the same location with a view to exhibiting a selection from a number of successful panels for Associate distinction in Travel. Those panels were from Tony Smith ARPS (2009), Richard W Lewis ARPS (2013), Kathryn Phillips ARPS (2019) and Justin Cliffe ARPS(2019)

In addition, we showed the projected images that were either medal winners or commended in the Group's Projected Image Competitions from 2015 to 2019, together with a number of the printed images that formed part of the Group's October 2016 exhibition at Fenton House in Bath.
