As photographic resident involved in a 17 year-long imaging project (2009-2026) of the human interaction with the ancient past at the excavation, I make regular visits to the workshop and photograph the work of colleagues dealing with conservation programmes. As is often the case the imaging is spontaneous. #### Blessing the flock by Simon Maddison LRPS





to a shortage of priests who serve many village parishes, and in this village is only monthly; the priest is from Franco phone (ex Belgian) Congo due to shortage of French priests.

## Cooling off by Lynda Morris LRPS





## Dads at a wedding by Joan Ransley






#### Pow wow dancers by Sheila O'Brien


when an eagle feather fell to the floor from someone's regalia and a ceremony was performed to retrieve it. The photograph attached is not part of that.

#### River detritus by John Walker LRPS







Taken June 15th 2019 at Linton village in Cambridgeshire this was the 3rd in a series of workshops by Designer Bookbinder Mark Cockram for members of the Society of Bookbinders. I had taken a number of images, mostly environmental portraits of the teacher and student relationship. I wanted to abstract that relationship a little and was drawn to the face printed on the pocket of Mark's overall as he was assessing a students work. It was not exactly set up because I saw the idea for the image as Mark was working and interacting with the students,

but I positioned the student's work on the bench at an angle for leading lines and asked Mark to stand next to it as he carried on talking to the student.

#### The Preacher by Chris Barbara ARPS

I was photographing Brighton Pride when I came across a group of Christians who had come down from London to preach their beliefs on the pavement next to the main parade. They were fenced in from the public with police protection. I have a series of images documenting the vibrant happy pride paraders dancing and making their own placards in good humored protest against the protestors.

I used the overhead light of the platform spotlight to light the tube






## Waiting for the gillets jaunes by Gerald Phillipson LRPS
