PAUL GRABER ARPS

Paul has had an interest in photography since the early 1980s, but this waxed and waned over several decades before he joined Guildford Photographic Society in 2006. Since then he has at times been Chairman, Programme Secretary and Competition Secretary at the club, as well as running several Special Interest Groups.

He achieved his LRPS in 2012, and hardly rushed before getting his ARPS with a panel of autumn woodland landscapes (most definitely in colour!) in 2021. He became a judge in Surrey Photographic Association in 2016 and has recently been promoted to its 'A' List.



EDDIE HYDE FRPS

Photography has captivated Eddie since he was a small boy with a Kodak Brownie 127. He doesn't claim to have any images from that period of any worth but by the time he was at University studying Chemistry the skills he acquired worked well in the darkroom and he does have one or 2 images from this time that he still enjoys.

He has explored a wide variety of genres and styles over the years. However, he always returns to the landscape and never feels more alive than when he is outdoors, "anticipating the moment when the magic might happen: the light, weather and landscape combine to create art in front of one's eyes and you are there to capture it.".



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Our first thoughts for this year were that we would be able to run the competition from the theatre at RPS HQ, Paintworks, Bristol but a number of factors conspired against us, so the decision was taken by the committee to run it on-line again. Having done this three times already, our systems had become well-polished and bearing in mind the various benefits of minimal cost; our selectors and competition secretary (me) being comfortable at home and therefore no travelling, etc., any argument to operate otherwise was difficult to counter.



Our three selectors: Holly Stranks FRPS, Eddie Hyde FRPS and Paul Graber ARPS had been briefed a few days earlier on the operation of the system, so we got off to a flying start at 10:00 using our usual 'Zoom' webinar method with selectors moving out of that session to a private Zoom-room so as to discuss the acceptance levels, ribbon and medal winners. The event was well subscribed with a total of 1,517 images from 280 members, comprising 717 Colour, 562 Mono and 238 Altered reality.

Progress was brisk: the average time for viewing each image was around 6 seconds, which some people might argue is too short a period to get a full and good impression of a picture. However, our selectors are very experienced in picking out worthy work at this speed and - of course - they got to look at the best (= higher scores) of each class at length in the private room so as to arrive at their top choices. Following this, they returned to the webinar to declare their awards. At 16:00 we all breathed a sigh of relief due to the fact that the day had gone without technical difficulties!

As for last year, the award winners and all accepted entries are printed within this catalogue. Also, they are available to be viewed in detail in our 'Hall of Fame' gallery on the DI image website at www.rps-dig.org - you will need your RPS membership number to log in, and then click the 'view the gallery' button for this. Incidentally, images from previous competitions and exhibitions are also to be seen in that gallery.

Finally, my sincere thanks go to our trio of doughty selectors for their effort on and before the day; Neill Taylor LRPS for managing the on-line 'Zoom' show; to all the entrants for taking the time to be involved, and the 250-or-so DI members who attended the webinar.

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Hut in the Trees

Rachel's Comments

"This photo was taken on a day tour of Vesteralan, an island group near the Lofoten Highlands in arctic Norway. In March, when we were sailing up the Norwegian coast, the snow was very deep. This led to me looking for and taking more simplified compositions. The clump of trees on the hillside immediately grabbed my attention. The trees sitting on the top of a curved slope with a small hut in the middle was just crying out to be photographed. The sun was shining and the shadows added to the depth of the image. Shot in colour the photo looked lovely with the hut having a red door and green roof but I was not happy with the bright blue sky, so I decided to convert it to monochrome. Edited in Lightroom to get both blacks and whites as I wanted them, I made a little adjustment to brighten the sky as I wanted to keep the image high key."

Holly Stranks' comments

"I wish I'd taken this! Excellent. We can only imagine and hope that we will get to see this image in print at some point in the future."

Paul Graber's comments

"I would love to see this in printed form — I think it would make a stunning fine-art picture. The excellent variation of tones from one end of the brightness scale to the other is well handled. The symmetrical curve of the hill perfectly complements the simplicity of the image."

Eddie Hyde's comments

"The simple composition and symmetry is delightful, wonderful. Most photographers will be asking "where's that? How can I find it?" because most of us would be proud to get an image of this kind. If you can generate that kind of photoenvy, I think you've done a great job!"

Thistle Mantis

"This image of a thistle mantis was shot on a club night a few months ago. The club has a member who is a keen wildlife photographer and over the last year or so he has started to keep a few mantises to bring along for a night out at the club every now and then.

For the technically minded this image was shot using a single overhead flash linked to my trusty Lumix G9 with a Leica DG Elmarit 45mm macro lens, handheld. The image was then processed using Lightroom and Photoshop in a very limited way. Managing depth of field is quite a challenge with these small insects.

I chose this image because of the elegant way that the mantis is displaying, which gives me the impression of a fine lady in an impressive ball gown ready to perform on the dance floor. I always try to create a story to add to my pictures."

Paul Graber's comments:

"What a cracking image! The background works incredibly well, showing off the detail and sharpness of the insect. The lighting and pose, if one can call it that, is appealing and it's superbly put together."



Copper on Blue

"I took this picture at Bodnant Garden, Conwy, North Wales on a beautiful evening in July. There was very little wind, perfect for both flower and insect photography. There were still lots of bees and a couple of butterflies feeding off the flowers in the "Round Bed" I was attracted to this small copper butterfly on the Eryngium flowers. It posed perfectly for a few seconds before flying off. I liked the combination of the blue of the eryngium against the orange of the butterfly. At the same time, I took an out-of-focus picture which I overexposed by one stop from the previous frame. The colour balance of both images was adjusted and then the two frames were blended. Finally, I enhanced the butterfly by a small amount."

Eddie Hyde's comments:

"A very beautiful nature picture, with gentle hints of green in the gorgeous lilac overtones of the image. The detail in the golden butterfly complements the overall softness of everything else and the alteration of reality is so subtle as to be almost unnoticeable: this really sets it apart from the bulk of entries and makes it a definite gold medal winner."



Stand Off

"I couldn't believe my luck when I saw the egret so close to the crocodile. I was on the Chobe River searching for basking crocodiles when I saw the egret. My first few shots looked as though the egret was standing on something, but on closer inspection it was a crocodile. In fact I did capture the egret standing just behind the crocodile but unfortunately the crocodile wasn't fully in the frame. For this very lucky shot I did enhance the colour of the crocodile a little so as to make it stand out because it was rather indistinct."

Paul's comments:

"There's an excellent piece of story-telling going on here: we are left in no doubt as to the truth of the title. Compositionally, the angle of the bird adds tension and the semi-hidden threat of the reptile adds to the tautness. It's quite minimalistic but this serves to focus our attention on what might be about to happen."



Fox in the Long Grass

"The photograph was taken from a hide in a meadow in Buckinghamshire. A low viewpoint is often desirable for wildlife photographs but is not always achievable from a hide. Fortunately, this one was positioned down a slight slope, which - looking upward - helped. Towards the end of the evening this fox walked into view and after spending a few minutes in the meadow, it turned directly towards the hide resulting in an ideal pose for a portrait shot of the animal submerged in its surroundings.

Post-processing was minimal: In Lightroom I made tonal adjustments, removed some distracting grass seed heads using Photoshop and sharpened it a little. I particularly enjoy how the subject stands out in the wide area of consistent texture and tone. A shallow depth of field also helps to achieve that."

Holly's comments:

"A stunning shot – very impressive. Anyone who knows my work will realise that this hits the spot with me. The clarity in the fox's eyes really connects with the viewer. I love the composition: simple and central and I also love the grasses around the fox's head which lend a gentleness to the image."

In The Clear

"For a few years I was an official photographer for Weymouth Beach Motocross which gave me trackside access which public spectators did not have. This is an exciting event, taking place on a Sunday in October. Weather is a big factor – the wind speed and direction are always a concern due to the risk of getting sand in the camera. It is an unpredictable event due to the speed of the motorbikes and the issues arising from racing on sand – trackside photographers need eyes everywhere and need to be able to move fast in the event of a bike veering off course! 'In the Clear' is pretty much as taken. It has had some clutter removed and the distracting background taken down a little but the appeal of the shot was the rider in red, clear of the other competitors, sand spraying out and eyes clearly visible."

Eddie's comments:

"I was struck by the quality and story telling aspect of this picture. Helen has used a fast shutter speed which in the realms of action photography can be a killer because stopping all the motion can ruin the shot. However, the flying dirt and mud takes us into the picture knowing that there is furious activity going on. The cyclists in the background give the picture context and make us realise that the main subject is very keen on getting ahead in the race. The quality of the picture is excellent: we can see the determination in the eyes of the rider and the chosen depth of field is superb."



Watch the Shadow

"My image of the African penguins at Boulders Beach was taken on a recent trip to Cape Town. They were so amusing to watch it was hard not to take too many images of their antics! Although the middle of the day didn't offer ideal shooting conditions, it was great for enhancing the shadows.

Managing to isolate three penguins which lined up perfectly was a bonus. I particularly liked that the right hand one looked as if he was lifting up his foot so as to avoid the shadow, whilst using his flippers to balance. It made me smile. "

Paul's comments:

"This is another good example of a simple and straightforward image with the subjects caught in a fortunate composition. The layout, separation and expressions on the penguins' faces say it all!"

"This picture had been lurking on my hard drive for several years because I wasn't sure if it was worth airing: I had assumed that most people would like to see the beautiful tulip in its true colours! However, the lines and delicacy of the flower begged for a mono treatment. I am also a great fan of triptychs – after all you get three images for the price of one – which can reveal so much more of the subject. So I dug it out from the depths of the computer and hoped for the best. Imagine my surprise when I was awarded a ribbon!"

Holly's comments:

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"A beautiful image, plain and simple which caught my eye straight away. A lovely calming picture, presented in excellent fashion with a good tonal range even in this predominantly high key version."



The Pastor of Brick Lane



"I have been taking pictures of people at large for many years, visiting places like Brick Lane in the East End of London, where there are lots of characters who are nearly always happy to be photographed. This man's gravity, collar and hat suggested a clerical role, but I don't know if he was a Pastor or not. Subjects usually smile: I take a few shots, and then I ask for a serious expression. The monochrome conversion was effected using 'Silver FX'."

Eddie's comments:

"Congratulations on getting this image, Paul. This struck me straightaway as a perfect example of exposure control in a strong 'street' portrait. The tonal range is fantastic and the engagement that you got with the subject is hard-won: you have obviously created a rapport sufficient to get to that point. A technically excellent piece of work."



Geometric Abstract

By Valerie Walker ARPS

Ribbon awarded by Paul Graber ARPS

"I have been interested in photographing architecture for some time, usually concentrating on creating abstracts of parts of the structure rather than taking the whole building. This image was created from several shots taken at London Metropolitan University. The exterior is interesting as it has metal cladding in hexagonal shapes subdivided into triangles. If you look closely you can see the rivets that are holding the panels together. The windows are not square and there is a very sharply angled roof line. All of these aspects suggested lines and angles but one picture on its own was not enough to make a striking image. Therefore, I used several layers and 'difference' blending mode to overlay aspects of the building. I also found that the colour changes caused by the blending mode improved the image. I really like the way that the projecting parts of the window frames give it a three dimensional effect as it appears that they are jutting out over each other. "

Paul's comments:

"I think that this is a lovely mix of contrasting but co-operating colours which really grabbed my attention. The geometry is striking and in combination with the colours in the image it defines a really worthy ribbon winner."



Lynx Stare

"This was taken at a local wildlife park. My aim was to capture an image to process as a creative animal portrait. Fortunately, the Lynx seemed curious about visitors and stayed still long enough for me to get some shots. I chose this image because I liked the angle of the head, his intense stare and how the focus dropped away, which I felt suited a more artistic processing.

I use Photoshop Elements with the XXL plug-in. I started by making a solid white layer beneath the image, desaturating the whole image then masking back the colour in the lynx. I noticed a green tint remained on his chin fur from the grass he was sitting on, so removed that. I then used a tiny amount of the Subtle Glow filter in Topaz Simplify to bring out texture in the fur. Finally, I added a texture layer of beach sand, selectively removing it from the centre of the face."

Holly's comments:

"This shot of a Lynx immediately caught my attention: beautiful colour, with excellent detail where needed which fades away into the background creating a soft finish which is both striking and calming. Congratulations on a well-executed image."

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Homeward Bound



"My approach to photography is to try and create images which tell a story or evoke an emotional reaction. This may be by producing composites, or as in this case, modifying an image using a variety of techniques. The original photo was taken at the entrance to Newlyn harbour and although I thought it a satisfactory image, I felt that it lacked impact. In Photoshop, I applied textures, modifying each one using layer blend modes, opacities and masking as appropriate. I also used the Sunlight filter in NIK Color Effex, along with levels and hue and saturation adjustments. The resulting image with its painterly effect conveys a story far removed from reality but for me, a far more pleasing image."

Eddie's comments:

"What I liked particularly about this image was the subtly alteration of the reality. This is a very painterly creation, but still with all the clarity of the original photograph. A beautiful, peaceful image with a calm colour palette and alterations which have been made very purposefully."
