




John Kay LRPS - Champagne Campaign

"In January 2020 John was told that he needed to have open heart surgery to repair a leaking valve - however due to lockdown restrictions in March the operation was postponed. With a lull in infection rates during the summer he was called to the John Radcliffe Hospital for surgery, during the operation it was discovered that he had two valves that needed repair, not one, making the operation longer and more complex than expected. One week post surgery he was released and came to stay with us for a few moths to recuperate - this picture was taken on his third day with us. He was still very tired we managed three or four images and called it a day. John loves this picture and has even given a copy to his surgeon, as he likes to say 'having a sick note from the doctor doesn't get you out of modelling' "






Alan D Horn - Our disappearing coastline






Ron W Evans - Boyhood' (from the surrounding neighborhood)

As part of a personal project during lockdown I began docuemnting my local community with a mixture of documentary images, doorstep portraits of local residents and portraits of local shop and business owners.






Andy Holloway - Into the Rain

I love the look of pain and determination on the faces of these two canoeists on what was a cold and wet day in January






Katherine Maguire - Damaged Sight

"Another in my series, life with damaged retinas, part of my work towards an ARPS panel. Having lived with vision problems for over 30 years, I was diagnosed with Presumed Ocular Histoplasmosis Syndrome in 2013, which is a rare disease of the retinas. Leaving me with scarred retinas, my central and peripheral vision is now permanently blurred and cannot be corrected by contact lens or glasses.

By combining two images taken at the same time using a 50 focal length lens, I am attempting to illustrate what it is like to live with damaged retinas, First image is taken at an aperture of f2.2 at a focus distance 5m and represents how I see the world, the second is then taken, changing the focus distance to infinity and aperture to f9 to represent how others see the world. Then both images are combined into them one image.
