

DR David Pechey - Searching the skies

Jodrell Bank Observatory was created a UNESCO World Heritage Site in August 2019. Being within an hour of home I wanted to record this high-tech research installation resting in the gentle Cheshire countryside. A couple of visits produced several fairly predictable photos of the imposing radio telescope against alternately blue skies and stormy cloudscapes. But I felt none of them fully reflected the mood of the UK's major site seeking signs of extra-terrestrial life. With the site closing at dusk I went again and waited for the setting sun to pass behind the Meccano-style structure supporting the main dish to capture some of its unworldly atmosphere. The village itself is quiet on a Friday morning, the only movement a seemingly stray camel rooting through the bins by the solitary row of shops that serves the few residents. Everybody else is away at the races.


Lorraine Poole - The Painted lady



I had the pleasure of meeting this lovely lady a couple of weeks ago. She contacted me to get some photos done of her amazing body art. At 70



Background: For four years I have been documenting Hull Fair and this year i was able to access the site whilst the rides were being assembled. This particular 'Big Wheel'was making its first appearance at the fair and I was keen to record its 'build'. You can see from the scale that the two construction engineers are dwarfed by the central spindle as it is being lowered carefully into place.

Katherine Maguire - Damaged retinas

This image is part of my work towards a ARPS panel. I suffer from a disease that can cause blood vessels to form on my retinas, which in turn cause damage and leave behind scars. The scarred areas of the retinas are no longer able to process light correctly. The scars have developed on the edge of the macular of each eye. This has resulted in my central vision is being blurred, as the brain uses this vision to focus the light that falls on the rest of the retina, my whole vision becomes blurred.

By combining two images taken at the same time, I am attempting to illustrate what it is like to live with damaged retinas. Using a 50 focal length lens, an aperture of f2.2 at a focus distance 5m on half of the image is produced to represent how I see the world, with only within 10 metres being in focus. The second half is then taken by changing the focus distance to infinity and changing the aperture to f10 and then combined to create one image.


Sue Surita - Littlehampton Skate Park

Bill Brooks - East and West




